Topic: Challenges, possibilities and critical questions for curriculum decolonisation

In this webinar, the speakers will present their recent paper that provides a critical and decolonial perspective about curriculum decolonisation and internationalisation in South Africa. They will unpack how hegemony, ideology and power impact, influence and shape the curriculum and contribute to the maintenance of Eurocentric epistemic hegemony. The speakers will also explore how to think otherwise about the world, knowledge and curriculum, framing this around a critical understanding of historical and contemporary politics, geopolitics and coloniality of knowledge. This includes an interrogation of historical workings of power and domination, hegemonic and ideological assumptions, and how all this continues to shape knowledge and curriculum. Most importantly, they will discuss a set of critical questions that can assist academics and curriculum developers in assessing what is amplified and what is silenced in the curriculum. This process can contribute to curriculum decolonisation and the promotion of epistemic plurality in higher education.
